

The OTA Program

The Occupational Therapy Assistant Program at Grossmont College teaches students to provide services to those individuals whose abilities to cope with tasks of living are threatened or impaired by developmental deficits, the aging process, poverty, cultural differences, physical injury or illness, or psychological and social disability.

Occupational Therapy serves a diverse population in a variety of settings such as hospitals and clinics, rehabilitation facilities, long-term care facilities, extended care facilities, sheltered workshops, schools and camps, private homes, and community agencies.

Licensed Occupational Therapy Assistants (OTAs) work under the direct supervision of licensed Occupational Therapist (OTs) to provide all levels of patient treatment. OTAs assist OTs in assessing patient needs, determining therapeutic goals, planning and implementing treatment activities, communicating with patients and health care providers and documenting patient progress. They utilize purposeful activities, manual and creative arts, to help patients achieve their highest level of function.

The Occupational Therapy Assistant Program prepares the student for an Associate in Science Degree. In addition to the major coursework, the major requires selected general education courses from the biological, social, and behavioral sciences. OTA major coursework is offered evenings only. Level I and II fieldwork experiences are available daytime only. **All GE coursework must be completed before prior to OTA 241 and OTA 251.**

EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES

Students today can look forward to dynamic careers working in multiple settings with people of all ages. And the employment outlook for occupational therapy assistants is bright! Recent information published by the U.S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics reveals that the job outlook for occupational therapy assistants will continue to improve steadily for the foreseeable future. IMPORTANT: Students accepted to the OTA Program are required to undergo a total of 2 background checks and urine drug screening tests. Once prior to starting the program and being placed at any clinical site and again during the 2nd year of the program. Students are responsible for a minimum cost for these procedures. Failure to pass either or both of these procedures, or any prior convictions of a misdemeanor or felony may interfere with acceptance to the program, clinical placement, NBCOT testing, eligibility for state licensure or securing employment. The OTA Program cannot advise students on individual background checks or drug screens. Prerequisites

The Occupational Therapy Assistant Program admits a limited number of students every summer semester. To be eligible to apply for the program, the following must be completed:

1. High School graduation, equivalency, or a higher degree.
2. Required immunizations. Completion of the HepB series and a test for immunity, or a positive Hep B immunity test. Tdap, MMR series and Varicella series. All have specific requirements, refer to the program website for detailed information.
3. Completion of Anatomy and Physiology. Anatomy and the combined Anatomy and Physiology I and II to be completed with a grade of “C” or higher and must include a lab. Physiology (Bio 141) does not require a separate lab course. Courses taken for the OTA major must be taken at a regionally accredited institution.
 - a. Anatomy and Physiology (Bio 140, 141 or Bio 144 and 145)
 - b. Science recency requirement- Anatomy or Anatomy and Physiology II must be completed within **10** years of the application date.
 - c. If taking the science prerequisites as a series (offered as part I and part II), applicants are strongly encouraged to complete the entire series at the college in which they started part I. This enables the student to maintain continuity with course content.
4. Completion of **one** of the following course:
 - a. FS 120 – Human Development
 - b. CD 125 – Child Growth and Development
 - c. CD 131 – Child, Family and Community
 - d. ETHN 125 or PSY 125 – Cross-Cultural Psychology
 - e. PYSC C1000 – Introduction to Psychology

Prospective students may submit a completed application online throughout the year once prerequisites and required immunizations are complete. You must also apply to Grossmont College and send 1 set of transcripts for all colleges attended to Admissions and Records when applying to the OTA Program.

The program application link and accompanying forms can be found on the website. Additional requirements will be needed when accepting an invitation to the program, specific information will be provided to the student on acceptance. It is strongly recommended that students complete their General Education requirements prior to being accepted in the program.

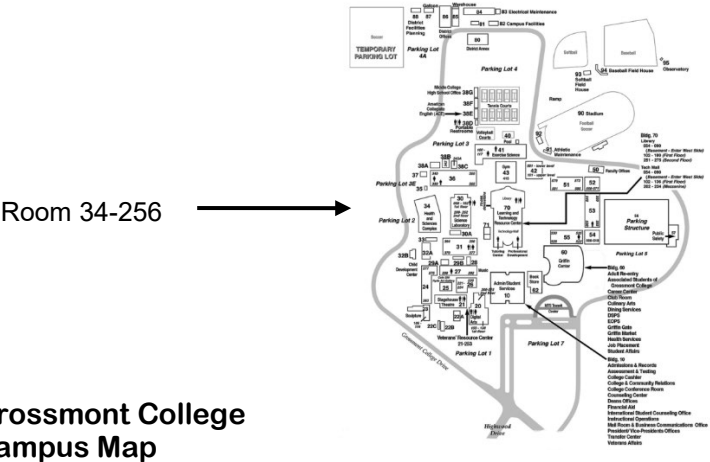

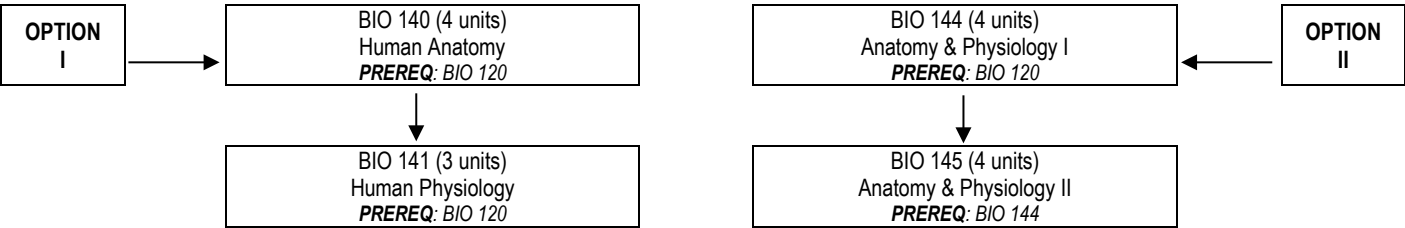
